## YOUTH WEEK IS STILL YOUNG!

1. Start with talking to young people in your local area about what sort of activities they want to do in Youth Week.
2. Talk to young people from your local Youth Advisory Committee about organising Youth Week activities. If your area doesn't have a Committee - start one!
3. Liaise with your Local Council on organising Youth Week events and activities. Find out details of your Local Council at [www.dlg.nsw.gov.au/dlg/dlghome/dlg\\_home.asp](http://www.dlg.nsw.gov.au/dlg/dlghome/dlg_home.asp).
4. Check out the NSW Commission for Children and Young People's TAKING PARTicipation Seriously Kit at [www.kids.nsw.gov.au/director/resources/participationkit.cfm](http://www.kids.nsw.gov.au/director/resources/participationkit.cfm). The Kit is a great resource that provides practical advice about how to involve young people in activities, events and decision-making about issues that affect their lives.
5. Don't forget that Youth Week isn't just about youth events; it's also about young people raising issues of concern and asking the wider community to not only listen, but to acknowledge and celebrate the positive contributions made by young peoples' efforts and achievements!
6. Network with Indent and keep up to date with the all latest happenings in the all-ages scene. 12. Apply to the NSW Government Boards and Committee Register to have your say! The NSW Department of Premier and Cabinet, maintains a register of people who are interested in being appointed to Government Boards and Committees. 13. Young people involved in organising Youth Week activities are generally volunteering their time. Volunteering reaches into virtually every corner of our society from emergency services to social welfare to sport to environmental protection and the arts. 14. Get involved in your School Student Representative Council or your University/TAFE Student Organisation and encourage young people to organise Youth Week activities through School or your University/TAFE campus.
15. Each year Local Councils can nominate their local Youth Week program for Local Government Youth Week Awards. It can be helpful to talk to groups of young people in other areas, who have successfully organised and participated in past Youth Week activities.
16. Use varied promotional strategies to get the word out about your local Youth Week events. Contact your local paper or local radio station; make your own posters; notify the Youth Centre, Community Centre, Education facilities; develop a community newsletter; or develop a My Space website. Word of mouth works wonders too!
17. Contact local community organisations or local businesses for their support for your Youth Week events or activities. They may be able to supply you with in-kind product giveaways, sponsorship or may be able to assist in promoting your activity.
18. The Internet is also a great tool, for both promoting your events (Local Council website, Youth Week in NSW website, My Space website) and actually running your events (Online Forum/Debate).
19. Check out [www.youth.nsw.gov.au](http://www.youth.nsw.gov.au) it's the NSW Government website for young people. It has heaps of resources, a calendar of events and opportunities for young people, and you can subscribe to be notified of opportunities to voice your opinion on youth issues.
